


Measles Updates


As of August 22nd, 2019, **1,215 individual cases of measles** have been confirmed in **30 states**. This is an increase of 12 cases from the previous week. Acute Flaccid Myelitis Update

AFM is a rare but serious condition causing limb weakness, mostly in children. Some patients also experience difficulty moving their eyes or having drooping eyelids, facial droop or weakness, or difficulty with swallowing or slurred speech. Three national outbreaks have occurred, with a total of 570 cases in 48 states and D.C. since 2014, when CDC began surveillance for AFM. **In 2018, 233 cases of AFM occurred in 41 states, making it the third and largest outbreak to date. Nine of those cases were in Illinois.** Most cases occurred in the late summer or early fall. You can find more information in CDC's [Vital Signs](#) and on the [CDPH AFM HAN page](#).
